Dear Dr. Shogan:

We write regarding alarming new information that Joseph V. Cuffari, Inspector General, Department of Homeland Security (DHS), may have violated federal law by willfully destroying federal records and not reporting the destruction to the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) as required by law.<sup>1</sup> We are deeply troubled by Mr. Cuffari's flagrant disregard for the Federal Records Act, and we ask that you immediately conduct an investigation into his potential unlawful destruction of federal records and report your findings to our Committee.

Inspector General Joseph V. Cuffari testified to the House Committee on Oversight and Accountability that it is his "normal practice to delete text messages" on an ongoing basis.<sup>2</sup> Inspector General Cuffari's testimony confirmed that he was unaware if deleted messages were backed up for record keeping purposes, raising further concerns about his intent to comply with the Federal Records Act.<sup>3</sup> Federal agencies are required to "notify the Archivist of any actual, impending, or threatened unlawful removal, defacing, alteration, corruption, deletion, erasure, or other destruction of records in the custody of the agency" including the accidental deletion of electronic records.<sup>4</sup> NARA lists cases of unauthorized records disposal on its website, however, NARA did not identify any cases of deleted records at the DHS Office of Inspector General (DHS OIG).<sup>5</sup>

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Inspector General Cuffari also provided a highly unusual and convoluted response to questions on his use of his government issued cell phone. Inspector General Cuffari said that he "[does not] use [his] government cell phone to conduct official business."<sup>6</sup> However, when pressed about how he uses his government issued phone, Inspector General Cuffari testified "to conduct business."<sup>7</sup> In a follow-up response, Inspector General Cuffari stated, "Not federal business considering that they are records."<sup>8</sup> It is concerning that Inspector General Cuffari is unable to clearly articulate how, if at all, he uses his government issued cell phone to conduct business.

Federal records law prohibits executive branch employees from using non-official electronic messaging accounts to conduct business unless a complete copy of the electronic messages is copied or forwarded to an official account within 20 days.<sup>9</sup> It is also a violation of federal law to willfully remove or destroy federal records.<sup>10</sup> It is unclear if Inspector General Cuffari followed federal law by copying or forwarding electronic messages to official accounts prior to deletion. However, Inspector General Cuffari stated he made the decision to delete messages unilaterally based on his own personal consideration of the messages.<sup>11</sup>

We are also aware of a complaint made to the NARA Office of Inspector General on March 13, 2023, regarding Inspector General Cuffari's deletion of federal records.<sup>12</sup> Recent reporting from the Project On Government Oversight (POGO) revealed that on December 22, 2022, an email was circulated within the DHS OIG stating that "a custodian indicated the text messages were deleted, in their entirety, from their government issued iPhone, and that the relevant policy for capturing such messages was not followed."<sup>13</sup> According to POGO's reporting, the "custodian" referenced was confirmed to be Inspector General Cuffari.<sup>14</sup> We, therefore, request that NARA undertake a review to determine what, if any, federal records were destroyed by Inspector General Cuffari and whether any other senior officials at the DHS OIG also destroyed federal records. NARA should also consult with the Department of Justice, as appropriate, if evidence confirms that Inspector General Cuffari or other senior officials failed to notify NARA about their unlawful destruction of federal records, in violation of the law. We
