GOP targets Clean Air Act's international provision

A Clean Air Act section that some legal scholars say provides the most efficient way of regulating greenhouse gas emissions is getting a new look after the Paris climate agreement and the legal uncertainty surrounding the Clean Power Plan.

The section gives U.S. EPA the authority to compel states to reduce emissions that contribute to health or welfare problems in other countries, as long as those countries reciprocate with like protections.

"We've long viewed Section 115 as a sort of an ideal supplement to existing regulation, a way to move forward from the Clean Power Plan," said Jason Schwartz, legal director at the Institute for Policy Integrity at the New York University School of Law.

House Republicans are taking notice. Rep. Scott Perry (R-Pa.) yesterday introduced legislation that would kill that section.
