On "811 Day," API Encourages Americans to Call 8-1-1 Before They Dig

On Wednesday, August 11, API Marked "811 Day" by highlighting the 8-1-1 infrastructure safety hotline, sending an <u>e-communication</u> to lawmakers and posting a <u>suite</u> of <u>social media posts</u> to drive home its importance. The federally mandated "call-before-you-dig" number is available to Americans in every state. According to the <u>Common Ground Alliance</u>, there are more than 20 million miles of underground utilities in communities across the nation. Estimates indicate that a buried utility is damaged in the U.S. every 9 minutes – causing potential injuries and service outages. By picking up the phone and calling 8-1-1, all Americans can reduce their risk of striking an underground line to less than 1%. We recommended that expert-level professional contractors and DIY homeowners alike use the hotline to learn where utilities are located before breaking ground on home improvement or other construction projects. In conveying this information, we also pointed out that our industry's commitment to safety and sustainability has contributed to a <u>38% decrease</u> in liquids pipeline incidents impacting people or the environment over the past five years, even as pipeline mileage and barrels delivered increased.

### API Publishes Standard to Enhance Process Safety Performance for Refining and Petrochemical Facilities

On Tuesday, API published the 3<sup>rd</sup> Edition of Recommended Practice (RP) 754 – Process Safety Performance Indicators for the Refining and Petrochemical Industries, an American National Standard, to assist in assessing and mitigating risk to improve safety performance. RP 754 was designed to identify leading and lagging process safety indicators useful for driving operational safety and system sustainability improvements at downstream facilities. The standard helps facilities implement a comprehensive program to reduce safety hazards through a system of continuous assessment and improvement, identifying trends and underlying causes and taking action to prevent their occurrence. RP 754 is not mandated by U.S. federal or state regulations, but it supports U.S. OSHA Process Safety Management regulation and other similar international regulations by identifying and creating a standard measure of safety performance indicators. RP 754 is also used in API's Process Safety Site Assessment Program (PSSAP®) and API's Process Safety Event data collection efforts.

### API Expands the Use of Standards in South America though MOU with Guyana National Bureau of Standards

Today, <u>API signed</u> a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Guyana National Bureau of Standards (GNBS), which provides Guyana's primary standards setting agency access to API standards and increases collaboration on safety guidelines and requirements for the country's growing energy industry. The MOU expands the ability of American and Guyanese subject matter experts to collaborate. Ongoing joint meetings and workshops with GNBS will be used to adopt and promote API's best-in-class standards, protocols, guidelines and recommended practices to enhance safety and environmental practices in Guyana. "We are pleased to partner with GNBS to advance safe and sustainable energy development in Guyana," Senior Vice President of API's Global Industry Services Debra Phillips said. "This agreement brings proven API standards to Guyana at the inception of its energy resources development, prioritizing safety, sustainability and environmental protection at this critical moment." The partnership reinforces several steps taken by API and Guyana in recent years to strengthen cooperation on information sharing and training. API also <u>signed an MOU</u> earlier this year with the Centre for Local Business Development (the Centre), Guyana's premier organization for natural gas and oil information, training and policy advocacy.
