INSIDE GREEN ACTIVISTS' CABINET DREAM TEAM: Activists on the left flank of the environmental movement are quietly pressuring Hillary Clinton to tap nominees for the Energy Department, Interior Department, EPA and other key administration posts who share their strident anti-fossil fuels values if she wins the presidency, Pro's Andrew Restuccia reports. The groups, including Greenpeace USA and 350.org, want reassurances that she is sufficiently committed to reining in oil, gas and coal development for the sake of fighting climate change, especially after hacked emails showed her team is wary of making big promises and occasionally dismissed activists' concerns.

Among their preferences for Energy Secretary are Stanford University professor Mark Jacobson, who has spent years modeling the effects of air pollution and he has detailed a plan to move the world toward 100 percent renewable energy, and former Michigan Gov. Jennifer Granholm, who has steadfastly opposed both the Keystone and Dakota Access pipelines. "We want the Cabinet choices to demonstrate that we're heard, when behind closed doors we're told to 'get a life," said one environmentalist, still smarting from stolen emails released by WikiLeaks that showed Clinton mocking greens in private comments to union members.

For EPA administrator, some greens favor Van Jones, a long-time environmental activist who served as President Barack Obama's green jobs adviser for less than a year, or Obama's first-term agency head, Lisa Jackson, returning to serve in a Clinton administration. They're also pushing Rep. Raul Grijalva, the Arizona Democrat who is a fierce defender of public lands, for Interior secretary. One activist even suggested that Jane Kleeb, a leader of the grassroots anti-Keystone XL movement, would be a good candidate for a job in a Clinton administration. And two names top the list of nominees who they would oppose: Colorado Gov. John Hickenlooper and former Obama White House climate adviser Heather Zichal.
