Objective: Support new remediation strategies for Wood River former refinery site

**Police station groundbreaking:** Plans for a groundbreaking ceremony at the site of a new police station in Wood River, IL have been delayed while the city and BP work to resolve concerns over loads that may be placed on an underground pipeline that passes through the development site on BP's former refinery property in Wood River. Representatives of BP Pipelines and Remediation Management are engaged in the process.

**BP Wood River website queries:** Ron Rybarczyk reached out to BP Fuels to coordinate a response to two recent queries to BP's Wood River website from a local business. JB Hutch Petroleum asked about opportunities for owning or operating one or more BP C-store sites in the St. Louis metropolitan area, with a particular interest on inner-city locations. In a separate query, Hutch also asked about opportunities for hauling diesel via its diesel delivery business. Rybarczyk reached out to Fuels to determine who could best respond to the requests, then called the local company to let them know BP Fuels will contact them to follow up.

Other activities

**Greybull Use Control Area notices:** Ron Rybarczyk worked with the RM team for the Greybull former refinery site to help prepare a legal notice and letters to landowners on and near the former refinery property to inform them of an upcoming public meeting regarding Use Control Areas (UCAs) petitions as part of BP's remediation efforts and path forward for the site. The public hearing will be part of the Greybull Town Council meeting Oct. 9. BP is seeking two UCAs -- one for soil and waste, and one for groundwater – which would provide various restrictions for future uses on the site.

Hammond, Ind. remediation properties: Ron Rybarczyk and members of the RM team managing the site of a pipeline release in a residential area of Hammond in 2010 met with a city councilman and a representative of the city pollution control department to discuss the long-term plan for the impacted properties. As part of its response to the 2010 release, BP Pipelines purchased the three properties and razed one of the homes at the time; the other two homes have remained vacant. The RM project team anticipates No Further Action designation for the properties in the foreseeable future. The city has expressed concern over converting the properties into a pocket park, fearing that such a use would attract problems and illicit activity.

Michigan remediation standards: Ron Rybarczyk organized a teleconference with BP's RM Michigan team and

Michigan API to review Michigan Dept. of Environmental Quality's (MDEQ) latest proposed revision of cleanup criteria. Rybarczyk and other members of the team also participated via teleconference in a Michigan Manufacturers Association (MMA) meeting to review the latest proposed revisions. MMA is embracing a plan to take a 70/30 approach toward the new proposed criteria, seeking roughly 70 percent of the content that can been viewed as acceptable, but flagging roughly 30 percent with which industry has considerable concerns. One such area of concern is whether MDEQ will provide language in the new criteria that will grandfather in remediation sites that have already received closure from the state. BP has multiple former retail sites that may be subject to a reopener under revised cleanup criteria if the grandfathering clause is not included. The BP group is working to provide input to API flagging other concerns.

### **BP Wind and Alternative Energy**

Objective: Re-engage with the larger Wind industry and increase significance of BPWE within it

Clanton, Poulton collaborated with AWEA to host a WSJ reporter/photographer at Fowler Ridge wind farm in Benton County, IN. The article was published this week and was far more focused (positively) on BP as the largest operator in the area. The article was part of American Wind Week activities but was guided by our side with the intention to support local government goals (awareness of the importance of the industry) and to proactively highlight the value of wind energy in Indiana ahead of some expected unfriendly legislation in the next state session.

AWEA's first annual American Wind Week occurred Aug 6-12 around the country with a capstone celebration event in Fowler, Indiana. BPWE supported the week through a coordinated media & digital campaign and at the Saturday event in Fowler.

• Cainhoy Plantation: Freeman has been contacted by the Lord Berkeley Land Trust as well as a local developer who has been engaged in negotiations with the owners of the Cainhoy Plantation and the Coastal Conservation League. There is a serious interest in re-opening conversations with BP following the development of a potential compromise attempting to address conservation and land use concerns as well as proximity of the project to the BP Cooper River plant site. In light of the hurricane, further discussions are temporarily on hold, but BP will have an opportunity to engage on this issue again in the coming days and weeks.

• SC Manufacturers Alliance: The quarterly SCMA Board meeting was held Thursday in Spartanburg where the board re-affirmed their continued support of the "Nuisance Bill" that SCMA has championed at the strong encouragement and support of BP and others in the manufacturing community. The bill remains on the Senate calendar where it was left when the legislature adjourned in May. Lawmakers will reconvene in January for the second year of a two year session.

Objective: Support the rollout of PTAir, including earning local, national and trade media coverage to support marketing of the product

Charleston Chamber article: Freeman confirmed details and solidified a plan to publish sponsored content along with a full color advertisement in the Charleston Metro Chamber's online publication and associated online and print materials that are widely distributed across the region. The article will build from the completion of the \$200 million infrastructure upgrade project and promote the rollout of PTAir and what that could mean for BP Cooper River and for sustainability goals of our customers and their customers. Freeman is working with Lisa Pirtle on content and with the brand team on advertising.

#### Other activities:

**Hurricane Irma**: Freeman also worked closely with the LT at BP Cooper River and in coordination with SC Emergency Management Division and the Governor's office to prepare for the storm, potential evacuations, to pre-certify business reentry, and to coordinate with our neighboring manufacturers throughout the planning process. Further, Freeman coordinated with Mike Abendhoff and the press office to respond to local media inquiries about BP Cooper River's storm preparations, evacuation plans and a follow up about storm impacts and response.

**Nuclear Meltdown**: BP has engaged with SCMA to request that they convene a roundtable to allow large energy users, like BP, NUCOR and others, to come together and discuss options and outcomes as state leaders determine how to respond to a variety of issues surrounding SCANA and Santee Cooper's abandonment of a massive \$22 billion project to construct two new nuclear reactors in Jenkinsville, SC. Proposals include rescinding the "Baseload Review Act" that impacted the financing of the project, firing of the board of directors of state owned Santee Cooper, sale of Santee Cooper to an out-of-state investor owned utility, moves to reverse a number of recent rate hikes, etc.
