H.R. 195 (Russell), Federal Register Printing Savings Act of 2017

H.R. 624 (Valadao), Social Security Fraud Prevention Act of 2017

H.R. 998 (Smith-MO), Searching for and Cutting Regulations that are Unnecessarily Burdensome Act of 2017

- 1) Mr. Cummings offered an amendment regarding protections for whistleblowers. The amendment was defeated by a recorded vote of 12 Yeas to 21 Nays.

H.R. 1003 (Norton), District of Columbia Courts and Public Defender Service Voluntary Separation Incentive Payments Act
