Dear Mr. Steinhafel:

On April 21, 2012, the New York Times published an article detailing the results of its investigation into allegations that top Wal-Mart executives “orchestrated a campaign of bribery to win market dominance” in Mexico.¹ If true, these allegations raise serious questions regarding Wal-Mart’s compliance with the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act (FCPA), a law which makes it illegal to bribe foreign government officials.

This morning, the Washington Post ran a front-page story reporting that Wal-Mart “has participated in an aggressive and high-priced lobbying campaign to amend the long-standing U.S. anti-bribery law that the company may have violated.”² According to the story, this campaign was backed by several companies and trade groups, including the Retail Industry Leaders Association. Your website indicates that Bill Simon, President and Chief Executive Officer of Wal-Mart U.S., serves on your Board of Directors.³

We are concerned about the role that Wal-Mart officials may have played in the efforts to modify the FCPA. It would appear to be a conflict of interest for Wal-Mart officials to advise on ways to weaken the FCPA at a time when the leadership of the company was apparently aware of corporate conduct that may have violated the law.

To assist our committees in better understanding Wal-Mart's role in efforts to lobby for changes to the FCPA, please provide the following information and documents:


1. A list of all Retail Industry Leaders Association members, senior officials, and staff who have worked on issues related to the FCPA and have been or currently are affiliated with Wal-Mart or any of its subsidiaries or affiliates over the past ten years;
2. All internal and external communications involving the individuals identified in response to Question 1 relating to the FCPA, including any communications about attempts to change provisions of the law or to repeal it;
3. All communications about the FCPA or any other U.S. anti-bribery laws between individuals affiliated with the Retail Industry Leaders Association and Wal-Mart officials, employees, or agents; and
4. All documents, including communications, relating to the actions of Wal-Mart in lobbying for changes to the FCPA or any other U.S. anti-bribery laws.
